Dear Confreres, Members of the Salesian Family and Collaborators,

Happy Easter! Jesus is risen! Alleluia!

In these times of grief and trials, the resurrection of Christ from the dead is the source of our living hope (cf. 1 Pt 1:3-9). Easter confirms to us that the love with which Jesus gave up his life on the cross is greater than every form of suffering, sickness, and pandemic.

In many ways, the pandemic has changed the way we experience being Church! However, the core message of the Good News, the love of God and the victory over death shines through and strengthens our resolve to rise again.

While it is true that the celebration of liturgies has undergone much change in this time of pandemic, is it not also true that our celebration of Easter this year (in the time of Corona Virus) is actually closer to the celebration of the first resurrection Sunday?

Comparing our experiences of these days with that of the apostles we find:

- a) In these days of lockdown due to Covid-19 pandemic, we are all constrained to stay in our homes.
 Where were the apostles on the first Easter morning?
 They too were huddled together in a closed room (cf. Lk 20:19)!
- b) Very few of us are able to personally assist at Mass on this Easter Sunday. How many disciples went to witness the resurrection on that first Easter Sunday? Mary Magdalene and a few women went to the tomb (no crowd)... and even they, initially, on seeing the empty tomb could only think that the body was stolen by someone. In the Gospel of John, Mary tells Peter and John: "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb and we do not know where they have laid him" (Jn 20:2, cf. Jn 20:15).

- c) In these days, while we remain closed up in our homes, only one or two go out to get the supplies. Is the situation any different from the apostles huddled in a closed room while only Thomas was out? (cf. Jn 20:25).
- d) On this Easter Sunday, even though we are celebrating Easter (resurrection from the dead), we are still gripped by fear of sickness and grieve over death caused by Covid-19. It is a little over three months since this thing has gripped us!

What about the apostles on that first Easter Sunday?

They too were in the grip of fear and grieving the death of Jesus. We know that, on that Easter Sunday, while some remained closed in rooms out of fear, other disciples were running away from Jerusalem to villages like Emmaus (cf. Lk 24:13)! Their hopes were shattered: "But we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place" (Lk 24:21)!

Yes, on this Easter Sunday, the day we celebrate the destruction of death, we are still in the grip of fear of death and sickness!

Ironic; but true!

In such a situation it is difficult to shout "Alleluia the Lord is Risen!" Our spontaneous shout is more like that of Mary and Martha, the sisters of Lazarus: "Lord, the one you love is sick!" (Jn 11:3) or like the apostles in the boat tossed by the storm: "Teacher do you not care that we are perishing?" (Mk 4:38). Our tear-filled prayer is similar to that of Jesus in the garden of Gethsemane: "My Father, if it is possible may this cup be taken from me" (Mt 26:39).

God, in allowing the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus has taught us that He does not always win over evil by miraculous interventions. He, sometimes, allows suffering, death and burial - even of His dearly beloved Son in whom He is well pleased! But in the resurrection of His Son, God shows that He is able to transform our failures into victories, and our sickness and death into new life.

The Paschal mystery we celebrate is not just the resurrection. It is a Solemn Triduum that comprises three realities, namely, suffering, death and resurrection.

This is what Jesus taught us when he said to Martha: "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in me, *though he die*, *yet shall he live*; and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die" (Jn 11:25-26). Yes, though we may die, we shall live; though we may fail, we shall be victorious. With faith strengthened by Jesus we shall soon be able to stand up and profess our faith in the resurrection of the dead, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting for you, for me, and for every one of our dear ones who have suffered or died in this pandemic.

And finally, as we suffer through the fire of Corona Virus, let us remember the example of the three young men: Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego. God did not miraculously put off the fire in the furnace. Instead, God put an angel (Jesus) in their midst [King Nebuchadnezzar saw a fourth one like the Son of God in their midst (Dan 3:25)]. They came out victorious.

Our victory depends not on the fires that we have to face but on *who* is there with us in facing the fires. Who accompanies us? Let the Son of God who experienced resurrection be our companion in facing all fires. It is He who keeps assuring us: "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live; and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die" (Jn 11:25-26).

Like the father who brought his child for cure to Jesus after the transfiguration, we too, facing the virus pandemic might be tempted to say: "If you are able to do anything, have pity on us and help us" (Mk 9:22). However, we need to be quick learners like that father, to correct ourselves and say: "Lord, I believe, help my unbelief" (Mk 9:24).

Peter and the apostles were like us today. Even after the resurrection of Jesus they remained closed in their rooms for a while. During that time they were strengthened by the visits of the resurrected Jesus in their closed rooms. He imparted peace to them (Jn 20:20). They were accompanied in prayer by Mary our Mother (Acts 1:14). They prayed for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

We too, strengthened by the presence of Jesus in our homes, strengthened by the intercession of Mary Help of Christians and the gift of the Holy Spirit, shall return to shout without fear! "Alleluia! Christ is Risen" and we shall be present to the young with new life and vigour.
